Meerut College, Meerut has a long tradition of extension services and work on socially responsible					
issues. Our vision and mission also includes production of socially committed students. The institution					
promotes the participation of students and faculty in NSS and NCC, Rovers and Rangers, Serva Shiksha					
Abhiyan, Community Development, Adult education & Literacy, blood donation camps, AIDS Awareness,					
Environmental Awareness, and Village Adoption programmes.					
Programme like adult literacy and environmental awareness are some outreach programmes organized					
by the institution. These programmes are integrated with academic curriculum as foundation courses					
compulsory at undergraduate level. Besides, these activities form an important part of curriculum in					
B.Ed. classes.					
The College promotes the neighbourhood network in which NCC cadets and NSS volunteers adopt					
nearby localities of BPL families and do social work like making them aware of the importance of					
cleanliness, enabling them to learn to write their names, etc. The NSS students also collect medicines					
from doctors, nursing homes and residential areas for distribution amongst the poor families. Under this					
programme every year the College NSS team collects medicines worth several thousand rupees. For					
proper distribution of these medicines, help of NGOs and chief medical officer is taken					
Every year inter-collegiate programmes of NSS, NCC, Scout and Guides are held. It provides a common					
platform for interaction with the students of other institutions and Universities. Extension activities					
such as blood donation camps, tree plantation and work done in BPL families under Sarva Shiksha					

Abhiyan and literacy mission have been very useful for local communities. Besides, students working is

neighbouring villages under Serva Shiksha Abhiyan, Swachh Bharat Abhiyaan also educate people about

health and hygiene, harmful effects of tobacco and alcohol, etc.

The communities are involved in the institutional extension activities by encouraging them to donate blood, donating surplus medicines and planting trees in their areas. They are also taught about the harmful effects of smoking, chewing tobacco and benefits of small families. Law department also organizes legal awareness camps in which members of judiciary also participate. The department also organizes programmes for NGOs and environmental awareness.

Most recently on 10th Dec, 2017 a huge rally was organized by two UP Battalions to mark the International Human Rights day.

6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Our aim is to remain at the forefront of Centres of teaching, learning and research. Our mission is to produce academically excellent students who are globally competitive and socially committed citizens of the country.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

Yes, the College has provisions and facilities to regularly update the data related to students and teachers at the MHRD site. It is annually uploading the AISHES formats and as and when the demand arises for other statistical details. The college has created a complete student's data base regarding their admissions, and also the keeps the details of the students' examination forms uploaded from college/ or eligible to appear from college as regular students in every academic session.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

MCM being an affiliated college to CCS University it follows a Curriculum set by the CCS University. By the use of CPE funds some departments like Defence, Botany and Zoology are already recognized as the star departments as they are using these tools even for UG students.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

The CCS University is responsible for all external exam policies. However, the internal exams are decided by a committee functional in the college.

6.3.4 Research and Development

The entire responsibility of planning and coordinating the research promotion activities are done by Research Advisory Committee.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instruments

The Central library uses SOUL 2.0 system and it is under the process of full automation. Departmental libraries are being automated.

Inflibnet facility is available at central library as well as to all PG and research students.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Ministerial staff is managed by college office and the specific duties have been assigned. They are trained regularly to abrest with latest technology.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Faculty is recruited at the state level by U.P. Higher Education Service Commission Allahabad. Some teachers have also joined Meerut College after taking transfers from affiliated colleges of CCS University Meerut after the permission from the UP Government.

Non-teaching staff is appointed by the college governing body as per the state government guidelines.

- Creation of departmental E-libraries so as to enable students to have access of celebrated text books online. Attempts shall also be made to connect our college to CCS library resources.
- In view of the MHRD guidelines, efforts will be made to make lectures notes, lectures summaries and ppts, available to students on college websites as E-resources.
- 6. The Meerut College, Meerut wants to upgrade its sports facilities at Bhama Shah Park. The college is keen to make its athletic tracks synthetic and its exiting indoor swimming pool renovated/or a new Swimming pool constructed as per International standards. A separate proposal is being submitted to UGC for the same.
- Plans for two new separate buildings for: Central Library and Central Instrumentation Centre is being chalked out in view of the constraints of space in the existing library building.
